Our vibrant city also needs an arts and culture commissioner to coordinate and drive such an important sector. And, last but not least, let's welcome more international visitors to show off our wonderful city to the world in 2025.

With the sights and sounds of the New Year's Eve fireworks still resonating, let's also give a "high five" to Foti Fireworks International for

their 27 years of creativity in staging the world's best fireworks display in Sydney.
